At the end of your trip, nothing beats getting on your return Air New Zealand flight home and being greeted with "Kia Ora," and the carved Maori panels at the airport.


Nothing, in my humble opinion of visiting about 20 countries beats

Auckland City Rail Link (CRL) is on track to open in 2026. For the new network to be as efficient and fast as needed from the outset, there are significant improvements needed to be made to tracks throughout Auckland. Auckland Transport has decided to invest in this work now, so the full impact of the CRL can be realised on opening.

The significant works include replacing ageing track foundations; making the network more resilient to weather by improving drainage and culverts; replacing worn rail and sleepers; improving bridges and a tunnel; and upgrades to critical track infrastructure, signals and power supplies.

This will require trains to be suspended for up to 96 days through to January 2026 with closures centred around holidays, weekends and evenings. That's on top of up to 53 days of partial network closure during that time, during which trains will run on a single line at a reduced frequency. While work will be undertaken around the clock to make the most of every single hour of closure, that still spells a significant disruption to train commuters. The Christmas closure begins 27 December through to 27 January 2025.

There will be an increased frequency of buses during this time with express buses and double-deckers when available. Unfortunately, the buses do not provide accessibility for wheelchair users.

As always, use the Journey Planner on the Auckland Transport to plan your journey.

The CRL is set to transform Auckland when it opens, so we trust the inconvenience will be worth your while.

In this quarter we saw the beginning of the end for the block of shops at 1971 to 1979 Great North Road being torn down to make way for the Te Hono Library and Community Hub.

The Spider came down – an impressive sight for those who happened by – it's much larger face-to-face than it looks from afar. And the notice-board was repurposed to a local early childhood centre. All thanks to a capable Eke Panuku moving team. Fencing has now been erected in preparation for demolition in December.



The final businesses moved out – Salvation Army unfortunately closing without being relocated; and Pacific Foodmart now working out of the Akshar Superette at 1964 Great North Road (just across the road) that Vipul and his wife Sonal also own. Says Vipul: "We are happy to close to make way for a better prospect for Avondale. Thanks for sharing all your support to date. You are all so supportive and kind to us." He promises all the same products and service at the new site but with even better pricing on Pacific Island food products like fresh taro, green bananas, frozen cassava, taro, turkey tails, lamb products, coconut cream & etc. "We can match any pricing or if it is possible we can beat any pricing too," he says.

We'll keep you posted. We've selected a few places the Spider could be returned to, and we'll be asking for your opinion. Let's hope we can see its return by the end of Summer.


# *Te Hono* and town square upgrade: Avondale's future is taking shape

Exciting changes are underway in Avondale. Auckland Council and Eke Panuku are bringing plans to life with Te Hono—a modern library and community hub - and an upgraded town square, set to become the heart of the neighbourhood with construction in 2025. This investment demonstrates our commitment to creating amazing places, supporting growth, improving services, and building a strong local economy.

#### What's happening next

- Building Removal at 1971-1987 Great North Road: Fencing is up and deconstruction is underway, clearing the site for Te Hono. To keep everyone safe, our contractors are following health and safety plans, aligning to WorkSafe NZ guidelines.
- Changes at Avondale Central Reserve: In early 2025, walking access from Great North Road will be closed. While the netball courts will also close, the basketball courts and learn-to-ride area will remain open, with access via the car park at 28 Racecourse Parade, Avondale.
- Access to 6 Racecourse Parade (old '3 Guys' site) Changes: Entry access from Great North Road to 6 Racecourse Parade will be closed, with entry via Racecourse Parade. Parking will remain available until the site is required for future development.

Together with Whau Local Board we're shaping Avondale's future. Thank you for your support and patience as we create these amazing public spaces and community facilities.

Following the resignation of Susan Zhu from the Whau Local Board, Valeria Gascoigne has been sworn in as our newest local board member. Of Samoan and Maori heritage, Valeria was appointed on the grounds that she was the next highest polling candidate at the 2022 local elections. 2022 local elections.

Currently, Valeria manages the Kelston Community Hub (now nine years old) and is well known across the Whau for her extensive experience leading community development and advocating for those in need. A project she is particularly proud of is bringing older Maori together to become more confident in the roles they are asked to play as local kaumatua and kuia.

What can we expect from Gascoigne with the 2025 elections just months away? Valeria says she's ready to hit the ground running. "I'm passionate about the environment and supporting youth, and will be looking for opportunities to create spaces for youth expression through the arts."

Though living in Kelston, Valeria lived in Wingate Street as a child and went to St Mary's Catholic Primary with St Mary's still her parish. Her parents were good friends with Pa Peter's parents, and a second generation of grand kids have returned there. "One way or another," she says, "my family and I always find out way back to congregating in Avondale."





# Ward Councillor to make play for mayoralty

Whau Ward Councillor, Kerrin Leoni, has announced she is putting her hat in the ring for the mayoralty of Auckland at the 2025 elections. We've seen her face at many of our local functions, but how much do we know about our Whau Ward counsellor and her suitability for the top job?

Well, she's a smart cookie for one thing. Before heading for Old Blighty for her OE, the forty-four year old had invested in property and completed a degree in social

work exploring the transition of young Maori leaving foster care. This set her up for senior social work and quality assurance roles which led to her running her own consultancy company in the UK. Kerrin's several contracts took her across the United Kingdom working in the Isle of Man, Guernsey,

Hampshire, and Basingstoke. The flexibility of the contracts, she says, allowing her time for travel throughout Africa and the Middle East.

With her expanded interests, a second Masters degree followed at Kings College, London in international politics and economics. "I'm very grateful to have been able to learn about property investment from a young age," she says, "and I wanted to help others. My thesis was focused on exploring how people in low economic groups can improve their wellbeing and in turn improve their lives."

A decade on, Kerrin returned home and it was a natural transition for her to apply for roles with the Local Board. Living in the city at that time, she ran on a City Vision ticket for Waitemata Local Board becoming the board's deputy chair. "It is probably one of the most controversial boards," she says, "with very wealthy people who have the money to go to the High Court if they're not happy with the board's decisions. So, it was a steep introduction to politics!"

Then with a coparent and two children in tow, she moved to Avondale, where she has other family, enabling her to enter the running for Whau Ward Counsellor which she won in 2022. Kerrin's heritage is from across the board. She whakapapas to Ngāti Pāoa, Ngāti Whanaunga,

Ngaitakoto and Ngāti Kuri. She's part Irish from Tullamore; Portugese and Italian (Leoni being Italian for "lion.") "It's a big mix that I'm very proud," she says. "I've been able to visit Ireland and live in Italy, to do all my family research on both sides, and I am now so pleased to be able to hand that information down to my children."

She also has family in Avondale.

I've never lost sight of my roots.

"I come from a very grass roots family; I still remember dropping my cousins down to The Taphouse when it was called Spiders!," she says. How does her global perspective impact on her role today? "I guess When I lived up North, I was living next door to Hone Harawira, and from a young age I was taught to stand up for people who don't have a voice. I see our poverty and how people are struggling, and I want to help."

Having worked as Councillor on the Revenue and Expenditure Committee, Kerrin can identify several ways Council can do better in providing this economic prosperity.

"That's the reason I've decided to run for mayor," she says. "I think Council can do better in terms of safety and expenditure. For example, we can work with local businesses by reviewing our procurement processes. We've got a lot of large contractors who subcontract down to smaller businesses; but we can scale down to allow for smaller businesses to get some of those contracts."

"And we need to reduce contracting and making sure we've got the staff in Council to get the work done."

Kerin also has a desire to see better tourism for Auckland, a city that traditionally attracts international visitors for just two days of their New Zealand visit.

"If we get the strategic vision right and overturn some of the more traditional ways of doing things, this next generation can look forward to a city that is as vibrant as Brisbane, with its similar population," she says. Having made her intentions known, there are a few hoops for Kerrin to jump before her final decision. Assuming she proceeds, she will stand as an Independent and she promises, "my goal will be to get out across all the communities in Auckland to see what the top issues are across the city."



# Avondale's own television Priest

Beloved of his parishioners, here's seven reasons we also think Pa Peter, the Maori Parish Priest of St Mary of the Immaculate Conception in Avondale, is special!

#### Maoritanga.

"I'm from the Hokianga; that's where Bishop Pompallier first arrived. We call it 'te kohanga o te hahi' - the cradle of Catholicism. It's something that my people are really proud of.

I think people love te reo; I always do the sign of the cross in te reo and we sing Mō Maria, a hymn that Bishop Pompallier wrote. It's our catholic anthem for the Auckland diocese in particular.

I was in Samoa recently for the ordination of Father Mosese, who was a parish priest at St Paul's in Massey; he became the new Archbishop of Samoa. We did a big Maori procession of returning him to his people. A few thousand of the congregation were from Auckland and they all joined in singing Mō Maria. Honestly, it was the most stirring thing hearing that Maori waiata in Samoa at the ordination of an Archbishop."

#### He's an Avondale boy.

"My Mum and Dad came to Auckland in the 1950s. Both ended up living in Astley Ave where they met, fell in love and were married in this church in 1960. I was born in 1963 and baptised here in this font. I also went to school here at St Mary's, so it really is part of my DNA.

I was walking with my sister last night and reminiscing



about the haunts and what a great time we had growing up here. We love Avondale; we love this parish.

"I always do the sign of the cross in te reo and we sing Mō Maria, a hymn that Bishop Pompallier wrote." I went to St Peter's College and caught the train from St George's station (now gone). The Tamahere's lived right there; I used to be so envious of them being able to just walk out the door and jump on a train when we had to walk from Blockhouse Bay Road."

#### He was Dean of Holy Trinity Cathedral.

"I was Dean at the Holy Trinity Cathedral but there was a need for a diocesan priest in West Auckland. I've had eight placements in my 30 years of priesthood. That's quite a lot, but I've been happy to follow where the need takes me and I've really loved all of them. I especially enjoy being back here in Avondale, my home turf. I know so many families here still – sadly, I'm burying parents of the kids I went to school with but, there's still lovely connections. I just love it."

#### He's live on Shine TV each week.

"During Covid, we learned we needed to have an online presence, a celebration of the Mass. Bishop Pat thought it was a great idea, and it just started happening. It was just a matter of asking people to help out, whereas "I'm a natural!" he quips.

I've watched so many masses online and found some of them pretty dull, so my answer was to keep the homilies short and to be loving and caring. It seems to work; I get a lot of lovely comments from people, letters and emails saying they love watching the mass, and find me to be "joyful."

There are still plenty of viewers - people in rest homes; those still a bit scared of getting sick. We had thought about stopping after Covid, but so many people would write in and say how much they love watching the show, so we continue because there's a need for it.

The filming is done a weekend in advance and there's a bit of work involved, but parishioners are welcome to join the congregation."

#### A Christmas Message?

"Remember that Jesus was born into poverty. His mother was turned away from various inns when she was ready to give birth, and it was the lowly shepherds that the birth was revealed to. Yet he became the Savior that brings lights and joy, love and hope to the world.

We can replicate that in our own lives as well, to be bringers of peace to our own situations, however humble. The world is full of need; and we can each become bringers of peace."



# A complexity of elements, colors and pattern

Last month's beautiful Great North Gallery series was by Anndivya Ram. In this project, Anndivya explores her Samoan/Punjabi identity,

her Samoan/Punjabi identity, delving into the internal conflict of needing to choose one culture over the other. By examining the shared experiences of colonisation, migration and discrimination faced by both communities in Aotearoa, as well as the significance of religion and the pride inherent in both cultures, she reveals how these identities are more intertwined than they may initially seem.

The dichotomy of elements, colors and pattern in Anndivya's work illustrates that while cultural intersections can create internal conflict, this complexity is a valuable aspect of her identity. Anndivya is the founder of Migrant Maharani's, a zine dedicated to the South Asian diaspora. Her mother, Pepe (Matautu, Lefaga), and father, Satnam (Bhaura, Punjab),

each migrated to New Zealand in the early '90s in search of better opportunities. They worked as fruit pickers on farms in Auckland before establishing their own tomato farm in Kumeū, where Anndivya and her two siblings were raised.

Great North Gallery is curated by Dayne Smith in collaboration with Eke Panuku and Phantom Billstickers. Portraits by Nathaniel Cohen-Goh and Latamai Katoa.





#### The village of Avondale.

We've all loved the Avondale sign currently exhibited outside Moana Fresh. The sign is reminiscent of the village signs found throughout Samoa, and has resonated deeply with locals with many people engaging with the work and taking photographs with it.

Siliga's work explores identity and analyses the influences of New Zealand society, popular culture, the church and Fa'a-Samoa (the Samoan way of life) – and how each of these contributes to his trans-cultural identity. Setoga's work has been exhibited widely with work held in the British Museum Collection, Te Papa o Tongarewa, Auckland War Memorial Museum and the Christchurch Art Gallery.




# Ferocious love of a māmā & pēpi.

Whau the People and Haven Foundation have collaborated on a third piece of work for the changing space at Haven.

The Avondale-based artist is Haser - one of a handful of artists at the forefront of the graffiti and street art scene in New Zealand; with over 20 years of contribution to the graffiti community, representing and exhibiting at both international and national events.

The work symbolises the interconnectedness of the Whau community and the nurturing space that Haven provides - a forever weaving community and a nurturing love for Te Whau represented by the ferocious love of a māmā upholding her pēpi.



Rangoli.

For Diwali, Jina of Jina's Beauty Point, created a rangoli design outside her store.

Traditionally made by girls or women, the Indian artform consists of patterns made from powdered limestone, red ochre, dry rice flour, coloured sand, quartz powder, flower petals, and coloured rocks. Some households in Indian create daily rangoli, elsewhere they are created solely for celebrations such as Diwali.

Designs are passed from one generation to the next, but today, as here, stencils are also used to save time.

Jina provides complimentary henna designs at the Avondale Library each Diwali as part of her way to give back to the Avondale community.
